NHFA's proposed amendment: (amendment language is in italics)

All children who are household members must be up to date on immunizations consistent with the recommendations of the American Academy of Pediatrics, the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and the American Academy of Family Physicians, unless the immunization is contrary to the child's health as documented by a licensed health care professional, <u>or unless the foster parents have chosen to utilize and comply with exemptions from child immunization schedule recommendations available under state law.</u>

NHFA's Reasons for Amendment:

- 1. States have the right and the flexibility to make laws and public policies regarding their citizens health and their health rights including the availability of immunizations and exemptions to immunization recommendations. Many states have constitutional protection providing the underpinning for exemptions as spelled out in the Ohio correspondence.
- 2. Federal constitution and federal law protect's religious freedoms and federal mandates should always reflect that.
- 3. The rights of foster parent and foster children regarding immunization exemptions should be protected like all other citizens.
- 4. Making unnecessary and unconstitutional restrictions on the criteria for being eligible foster parents will decrease the number of applicants and eliminate highly qualified and educated applicants.
